

- Starting mid-March the court systems (and to some extent litigation as a whole) across the country basically ceased to a halt.
- Took about a month for (<u>some</u>) court systems to reboot but with virtual hearings, other accommodations, and extensions to scheduling orders.
- 3. Trials (particularly Civil Trials) that were supposed to start in April, May, and June were all cancelled. Many have not been rescheduled yet.
- 4. Criminal Jury trials in MN (Pilot program) started back up in early June.
- 5. No Civil Jury trials in MN until at least September 2020. 5-6 month backlog. Some jurisdictions still shut down with reopening potentially not until 2021.




- 6. Delays also in discovery.
- 7. Initially many depositions cancelled or postponed.
- 8. Many attorneys initially being unresponsive or saying case needs to be stayed because of COVID-19, both PL and DEF.
- 9. Discovery has now resumed but in modified form.
- 10.Less in-person depositions and inspections but they are still occurring safe-distancing and masks.

- 11. Took time to adjust and figure out what we were going to do.
- 12. Some initially thought this would increase likelihood of claimants settling case for lower values. Some say this is happening, others not so much. Not seen in MN.
- 13. Meanwhile claims keep coming in.
- 14. Have not seen increased in litigation costs for claims but this may be delayed.
- 15. Added frustration and unknown for those dealing with claims.




COVID-19's Impact on Litigation and Claims – Use of Zoom/Virtual

- 1. Rather quickly pivoted to Zoom/virtual/telephone for hearings and depositions.
- 2. MN court system set up its own system and now uses Zoom.
- 3. Mediators were on this right away. Some are adept and sophisticated.
- 4. Depositions followed. Some depositions still being held in person but not common.
- 5. Virtual works better than anticipated usually.
- 6. Operator error/issues can still cause problems.
- Efficiency aspect.
- 8. First Civil Jury Trial in Miami this week Verdict on July 14, 2020

COVID-19's Impact on Litigation and Claims – Work-from-Home

- Some adapted quickly, others not so much.
- 2. Some better prepared, particularly on Company side who had already had in place work from home prior to COVID-19.
- Some additional up-front costs. Getting everyone laptop, additional monitor, etc...
- 4. Some people's home internet better than others.
- 5. Psychological impacts still being felt.
- 6. May be here to stay for some industries.







- 1. Some say there have been over 2000 COVID-19 related lawsuits filed.
- 2. "At least 50 federal securities cases with references to COVID-19 have been filed in the past three months, including merger challenges, regulatory enforcement actions and sprawling investor suits.." https://www.law360.com/articles/1278091 by Dean Seal, May 29, 2020.
- 3. Types: Direct COVID-19 exposure, employment-related claims, D&O claims, BI claims.

- 4. IN D&O world most of these types of cases involve stocks rising and then falling in a short period due to false or misleading statements made by officers, particularly in press releases and form 10-Ks.
- 5. Some, were (allegedly) outright lies and fabrications made by officers, such as in *Praxsyn* and *Sorrento*.
- 6. Some cases involved officers knowing more information than was released, such as in *Zoom*, *Carnival* and *Norwegian*, where the misleading statements were more subtle.



- 7. Business interruption suits **seem** to not be going anywhere.
- 8. Judges have been ruling that for BI claim to exist you need to have "direct physical loss or damage". *Gavrilides Management Co. LLC v. Michigan Insurance Co.*, case number 20-258-CB-C30, in the Circuit Court of the County of Ingham, Michigan
- Typically with COVID-19 you are not going to have "direct physical loss or damage".
- 10. Looks like insurers may prevail on coverage position that COVID-19 and resulting government stay-at-home orders have not caused any direct physical loss or damage that would trigger policyholders' business interruption coverage.

- 11. However, some jurisdictions have case law that states if you have a hazardous substance in the air that you cannot see, and it is making property uninhabitable or unusable, that is sufficient to trigger the direct physical loss or damage requirement.
- 12. Other case law that holds when property has been rendered unsafe due to contamination, it has incurred direct physical loss or damage.
- 13. Also important to remember most policies have virus/bacteria exclusion.
- 14. Probably still too early to definitely say how these all of these suits/claims will turn out.
